New Hope has enjoyed a wonderful summer season, with lots of tourists and businesses thriving, especially after the last two years. We have had several successful new business openings and we look forward to seeing what other ventures may begin.

With the end of the year approaching, Council would like to focus on some Health and Safety strategies for our community. Some recent items:



- We have purchased new AEDs (Automated External Defibrillator) to be placed in the Administration building, the Community room building, the Police Station, and the Visitor's Center. These machines are amazing in how they can save a life.... New Hope Eagle Fire Company, as well as many other organizations, can train you in how to use one. It may come in handy!
- We have been working on the various stormwater drainage issues in the Borough. Watch for updates in future newsletters and on our website.
- We enacted a short-term rental ordinance in the late summer to protect our community from becoming a community of rental properties for short-term leases (IE: Airbnb, VRBO, etc.).
- For the safety of our whole community, please mind the posted speed-limit signs in the Borough, especially in residential areas.
- Lastly, we had an unfortunate tragedy here in May, with a kayaker drowning in the river at the low-head dam section of the wing dam. On the NJ side, it is a wing dam, with sloping sides. Borough Council has formed a subcommittee to help address this situation to hopefully prevent it from happening again.

# NEW HOPE BOROUGH COUNCIL

New Hope has an elected 7-member Borough Council which plays a central role in borough government. Council sets policy, enacts legislation, adopts budgets, controls expenditures, appoints advisory commissions and boards, and hires employees. Council members are elected to four year terms, with either 3 or 4 members up for election every two years.

Council elects a President, Vice-president, and President Pro Tem from its ranks. The President, in cooperation with council, establishes standing committees and makes appointments thereto.

These standing committees generally consider all matters pertaining to a particular area of public policy, such as land use regulation, historic preservation, or recreation, and make recommendations to the full council.

Monthly public meetings are held on the third Tuesday of the month at 7 PM in the Community Meeting Room at 125 New Street. Workshop meetings are held at 4 p.m. on the first Monday of each month in the Community Room. Meeting dates and times are subject to change, so visit the Borough website for the latest information.

## BOROUGH MAYOR


The New Hope Mayor, Laurence D. Keller, has several roles:

## SHORT TERM RENTAL ORDINANCE

At their August meeting, Council enacted a new ordinance which provides policies and procedures for conducting short term rentals within the Borough. The goal of this ordinance is to ensure safety standards and compliance with zoning, building code and fire regulations. Owners who wish to offer short term rentals for their property will now be required to fill out a short term rental application, located on the Borough website, and submit for review and approval along with the related fees. The approved permit will be good for a period of one year and will require a renewal for subsequent years. To find out additional information on this, contact the Borough at 215-862-3347.

## Employee Spotlight:

### TOM CARROLL, Public Works

As we approach the end of 2022, we will be celebrating Tom Carroll's long dedication to our community's needs and congratulate him on his retirement. Although we could write a voluminous piece on all that Tom has done and seen in his 29 years with the Borough, we will provide a few tidbits and ask that you join us in wishing him a happy and fun-filled next chapter.

Tom was hired in 1993 and assumed the role of Public Works director in 1996, which was quite a big year to take on this important job.

The North American blizzard of 1996 was a severe nor'easter that paralyzed the East Coast with up to 4 feet of wind-driven snow from January 6-8. Another major storm dumped more snow a week later, followed by unusually warm weather and torrential rain, causing rapid snow melt and severe flooding of the river towns.

In the midst of the blizzard, Tom was out on the roads with the salt spreader and was flagged down by one of the New Hope Borough police officers who relayed a message from Tom's wife to come home right away. Tom hopped in the police car and was whisked away, lights flashing, to their home in Lambertville, where his very pregnant wife informed him that it was a false alarm.

It was only a few hours after returning to clear the roads that the same officer came looking for him again --- this time it wasn't a false alarm --- Tom and Jenny's baby daughter was born during the "Blizzard of the Century."

Tom's dedication to the Borough and neighborly demeanor are well known throughout New Hope.

Geri Delevich, who has been a New Hope resident since 1976, spoke of her first encounter with Tom. "I recall walking down the street and coming across Tom emptying the trash receptacles. As he worked, he greeted me with a beaming smile and friendly hello. I remember feeling that he was proud to be taking care of our town and happy to help make it the great place we all love."

Geri praised Tom's dedication over the years and his perseverance through the many Public Works challenges, snow removal, floods, storms and road repairs. Tom was there through it all. "Tom embraced our diverse and often quirky New Hope family. He worked with great pride, was easily approachable and ready to help in any way he could. On a personal note, I might also add that his golfing and olive oil are legendary!" she said.



Tom's deep knowledge of, and respect for, New Hope and its residents impressed Police Chief Mike Cummings from his earliest days in the Borough. "He was the first to tell me that you are not just an employee here, but you will establish many relationships with the great residents of New Hope Borough and will be asked to be involved with them in many nontraditional ways," Cummings recalled.

"Tom has made himself available, sometimes at moment's notice to provide public work services to aid the police department and make residents safe. Tom has responded at all hours of the night with barricades, chain saws, and other equipment to clear roadways." Chief Cummings added that Tom was instrumental in moving the department from North Main Street to New Street, using his connections to help furnish the police department as well as the new administration building with used furniture at no cost to the borough.

"Tom is considered not only a colleague but a friend to all the officers in the police department. Tom's unique sense of humor over the years has kept me smiling. We all wish him all the very best in retirement," the Chief said.

Tom's easy-going, but industrious demeanor was not lost on his PW Team. "Tom was very resourceful and could find a quick solution to just about any task," said Matt Decker of Public Works. "The staff of the Public Works Department will miss working for Tom and we're really going to miss his great sense of humor. We've all been with Tom for over 10 years." Matt said that the staff admires Tom's work ethic and that they knew what to expect on a daily basis. They wish him nothing but the best in his future.



## STEER CLEAR OF LOW HEAD DAMS

On the Delaware River at New Hope, near the Waterworks condominiums, a Low Head Dam reaches approximately half way across the river. There is a large opening for the moving water to pass through and then the low head dam starts again and terminates at the Lambertville shoreline.

A low head dam has the potential to be very dangerous. All small boats, whether under power or paddle and all swimmers should avoid getting too close.

From upriver, the water looks tranquil and calm. However, downriver of the dam crest, the water is turbulent and forms dangerous currents, with the water constantly churning up and down. If a boater capsizes or a swimmer gets stuck there, it is very difficult to break free of the currents, as the water keeps pulling the boater down into the river, which could lead to drowning.

Please be aware of where our low head dam is and stay away from boating or swimming near there. Always have a point of reference to make you aware of your proximity to the dam and make sure you identify a means of egress off the river.

We are concerned for the safety of all of our citizens and anyone who chooses to use the Delaware River for recreational purposes. Always wear Personal Floatation and carry a signaling device, such as a whistle and/or a cell phone. If you are on the river and find yourself in danger, do NOT hesitate and immediately signal for help. The New Hope Eagle Fire Department is always at the ready for emergency rescues.

### As noted in BOAT SAFE:

Low-head dams create dangerous recirculation currents at the base of the dam known as a hydraulic. As water flows over the dam, a depression is formed. Water downstream rushes back towards the dam face to fill in this depression. This recirculation of water is often called a "drowning machine." The features of a hydraulic include the following. (See photo inset)

- **Backwash:** Water flowing back toward the dam face. Water in the backwash can be highly aerated. Aerated water may not support a person at the surface.
- **Boil Line:** Distinct feature that separates the backwash from the outwash. Water in this area appears to bubble like water boiling in a pot. Boats that cross the boil line will have a significant reduction in performance with both propeller and jet drive units.
- **Outwash:** Water below the boil line flowing downstream.

Low-head dam rescue is one of the most dangerous types of rescues. Without planning and training, the rescuers can quickly become victims themselves.

# SHADE TREE COMMISSION – Tree Checkers Assure Healthy Trees

Despite the heat, it has been a busy summer for the New Hope Shade Tree Commission. In addition to participating in the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society's Tree Checkers program and preparing for an extensive downtown tree pit revitalization project, commission members spent time engaging with the community educating them on the importance of watering new trees during the first 2 years after their initial planting.

**Tree Checkers Program Keeps Trees Happy and Healthy.** Planting trees with the Tree Tenders program is a big investment for the community, and it's important to make sure that newly planted trees are healthy. The PHS Tree Checkers program helps young trees thrive by checking on their growth and overall health.

Trees planted through this program in Spring 2022 were examined and measured to keep track of important information that can be passed on to the homeowners taking care of them. If trees have not been watered enough or require frequent care, the report card can act as a reminder. In addition, the tree report cards are used to measure any tree damage as well as how "full" the tree growth looks.



**Porous Pave comes to town.** One of the Commission's main objectives in 2022 has been to identify and install Porous Pave in tree pits, in the main business area, that have healthy trees and minimal sidewalk obstructions to prove the ability to install the material in pits with existing trees. This is a new approach to the process which was first used on the trees in front of the Logan Inn.



With this new method of installing the product in a tree pit with an existing tree, a team from Hugh Marshall Landscaping will be able to revitalize eleven tree pits identified as good candidates this fall.

### **The benefits of the use of Porous Pave:**

- allows 60% water flow through to roots, reducing the roots from bulging up on the sidewalks;
- reduces tripping hazards; allows wheelchairs, strollers, etc to roll over a larger surface;
- uses recycled tires and reduces weed growth.

The intent is to continue this effort next year, with approximately 20 more tree pits being updated in town!

**Our young trees need our help.** During times of excessive heat and/or drought, extra watering is needed, and mulch is a must!

During the first two years of a tree's life after planting, they use a great deal of energy trying to establish a strong root system and need weekly watering of 15-20 gallons.

During times of heat/drought, you need to give your trees extra watering.

A thin layer of mulch spread around the trunk of your tree, but not piled up against the tree itself, will help keep the soil cooler and prevent rapid moisture loss. Be careful though...too much mulch piled up, known as volcano mulching, can cause a whole new set of problems.

**A gentle reminder.** The New Hope Borough Shade Tree Commission has waived the application fee to remove invasive or diseased trees that fall within the jurisdiction of the Commission, which, in part, are those trees that are "on any public highway in the Borough of New Hope, or that part of any tree, shrub or woody plant that extends within the lines of any public highway." Public highway includes any street, sidewalk, or alley. Property owners have up to 12 months to replant trees for any trees removed. ## Stormwater Management Ordinance Update:

New Hope Borough has updated the Stormwater Management Ordinance to bring it into compliance with the requirements of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP). The revisions are required as part of the Borough's permit from the PADEP for stormwater discharges.

The goal of the permit program is to reduce pollutants, such as sediment and nutrients, from entering our streams and the Delaware River. The requirements for inspection, operation and maintenance of stormwater facilities have been revised to provide methods to assure that these facilities are properly maintained and are functioning properly. In addition, the section of the ordinance which describes discharges to the storm sewer system which are permitted was updated. Some administrative revisions were made for the review and issuance of stormwater management permits for new construction.

### Fall Stormwater Tips



Leaf litter and any yard waste can cause harmful nutrient accumulation in nearby waterways.

- ✿ Compost leaf litter and yard waste for mulch or fertilizer.
- ✿ Do not rake leaves into storm drains, streets or waterways.
- ✿ Plant a Tree
- ✿ Prune your Trees and Shrubs
- ✿ Aerate your Lawn

## **PA ONE CALL – CALL 811 BEFORE YOU DIG!**

*Virtually anywhere you need to dig, there are probably underground facilities somewhere in the vicinity.*

Growing networks of telephone cables, power lines, and cable TV lines are joining the gas, water, sewer, and petroleum pipes. The odds of an excavator moving something besides dirt are growing each day. Even if you see overhead lines that doesn't rule out the existence of buried power, television or telephone facilities. Buried utilities are along your property line and sometimes between lots to serve neighboring homes.

Pennsylvania 811 does not locate or mark the underground utility lines. We are a communications network that relays your dig information to the utility companies within your municipality.

### **HOMEOWNER QUICK TIPS**

- One easy phone call to **8-1-1** three to ten business days before digging begins helps keep your neighborhood safe.
- Call on Monday or Tuesday if you plan to dig on Saturday or Sunday.
- The utility companies will mark where their underground lines are located with colored paint, flags or chalk.
- Do not remove the flags if you see them in your yard.
- Our service is no cost to homeowners.
- Did you hire someone to install your fence, deck or new patio? Ask to see the **PA One Call** serial number before allowing them to dig on your property.

# THE NEW HOPE AUTOMOBILE SHOW CELEBRATES 65 YEARS WITH A TRIBUTE TO THE 75TH ANNIVERSARY OF FERRARI

The skies were clear and the temperatures nowhere near the usual extreme heat for the 65th edition of The New Hope Automobile Show, which took place on the grounds of the New Hope-Solebury High School August 13 and 14, 2022.

This year was a celebration of the 75th anniversary of Ferrari, including a stunning and rare Ferrari 365 P2/3 Spyder (SN 0832) on display both days of the show. This rare, vintage Ferrari race car is one of only five Ferrari 365 P2/3 Spyder models ever created with only four remaining. This vehicle was a competitor in the legendary 24 Hours of LeMans (made famous in the film *Ford vs. Ferrari*) in 1965 and 1966 and has raced around the world.

The Show continued its tradition of presenting the finest and most rare classic and antique, foreign, and domestic vehicles. This continued the expansion to include Rods, Tuner, and Display Only classes of vehicles. Seasoned attendees know not to miss a thing by attending both days of the Show, since there is a completely different display of vehicles each day.

Domestic vehicles were featured on Saturday, August 13, and foreign vehicles were on display Sunday, August 14. The Governor's Cup (Best of Show) went to Gene Epstein in his 1956 Continental MkII Derham Victoria Coupé. # Historical Architectural Review Board (HARB)

There are many good reasons to be a part of the Historic District. An owner or potential buyer in the Historic District can be enthusiastic about the history they will be a part of. It is a privilege to be part of a historic community with its favorable emotional and potential financial rewards. New Hope is committed to its idea of preservation, while recognizing the modern wishes of the applicant.

Anyone who owns or is considering purchasing a property in the Historic District should be aware of the unique responsibilities of ownership in the District.


Local historic districts, like that in New Hope, have been authorized by the Commonwealth and applied by local governments. Our local Historic Architectural Review Board (HARB) is responsible for reviewing applications for changes contemplated on buildings within the historic district.

HARB applications address anything that has outside visibility, such as changes to paint color, window and doors, roofs, etc. They also include proposals for building alterations, additions, and/or demolitions. The Board reviews applications using criteria contained in the guidelines that have been adopted for the New Hope Historic District. The Board conducts its review in public meetings and works to assist property owners follow these guidelines.

It is not the intent of the Board to prevent property owners from making alterations to their properties. Rather, the Board works with owners to find solutions that maintain the "Guideline Directives." Adherence to the guide is evidenced by the majority of applications being approved.

While there are varying opinions of what works and doesn't work architecturally, the Board does its best to preserve the historic beauty of our community.

### **EVITA**

So this year we're tackling one of old Playhouse's favorite musicals: EVITA. Turns out it's a favorite of many of our current audience members, with strong sales since it was announced. And lots of groups... bringing business to Main Street this fall.

We usually create our own productions from ground up... but this one came to us. One of our artistic associates, scenic designer Anna Louizos (Mamma Mia, 42nd Street, Guys & Dolls), designed the show three years ago at the respected Bay Street Theatre in Sag Harbor. (Bay Street was founded by Emma Walton, Julie Andrews' daughter; Emma's father, famous set designer Tony Walton, was Anna's mentor. Small world.)

Bay Street is a smaller theatre than ours, and they came up with a very clever way for smaller theatres to do the show. It's set in a basement tango bar in Buenos Aires during the time when even the mention of Eva's name could put you in jail. A group of loyal Peronistas gather each year to celebrate Eva's life, and the story unfolds as magically as ever.

The director, Will Pomerantz, and Anna have re-concieved the production for the Playhouse stage, and we put together a new cast of Latinx actors eager to take on the challenge of putting their own stamp on these iconic roles.

Talking about small worlds: for about five years during my 35 years working in New York theatre, I was the production coordinator for the Really Useful Group... Andrew Lloyd Webber's production company. Evita was one show I did not work on... and it's a pleasure to help put the Playhouse stamp on it. We look forward to sharing it with you!

Did you know an ambulance bill can reach as much as \$2,000.00 or more? Unfortunately most insurance companies may only cover a small portion of that expense if any at all. The balance is billed to you, the responsible party.

Please consider membership to the Central Bucks Emergency Medical Services. Not only will you be supporting an invaluable service to our Community, a subscription can save you thousands of dollars in ambulance service fees.

By becoming a subscriber, the CBEMS will waive unpaid balances for medically necessary emergency services, after the health insurance company processes their bill. Take into consideration your deductible may be larger than the cost of service, in which case you would only be responsible for half the bill as a subscriber.

Our ability to operate and provide the community with our life saving services depends on being reimbursed for each emergency call. By becoming a subscribing member, you not only support our ability to provide emergency care, but reduce your own cost when your insurance provider does not.

We are your local Emergency Medical Services provider that will respond to your emergency when you dial 911. Though uncommon, there could be times when we are already on 911 calls and the next closest ambulance will respond. In most cases, area EMS units reciprocate annual subscribers. Typically, you will be transported to a hospital of your choice as long as it is within reasonable transport time. There are times where you may need to be transported to a specialty center to assure the best possible care for your injury or illness such as a trauma center.

■ **\$75 per year Family Subscription** covers all adults and any children under age 18 residing in the household.


■ **\$50 per year Individual Subscription** covers an individual living by themselves OR a child over 18 still living with their parents.




